For Council to consider the inquiry to Mayor Anderberg - re: survey support for RCMP

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council for the Town of Pincher Creek direct administration to sign the KeepAlbertaRCMP support survey on behalf of the Town of Pincher Creek.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The Provincial Government under the leadership of former Premier Jason Kenney were investigating the potential of terminating the policing contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and establishing a Provincial Police Force. Although there hasn't been much public movement in this regard since Premier Kenney stepped down, it may still be a consideration of the United Conservative Party. A local resident recently contacted Mayor Anderberg regarding a social media website that municipalities may consider signing to indicate their support for the RCMP to remain the official police force of Alberta. The title of the site is: KeepAlbertaRCMP. There is a list of 100 municipalities who have indicated their support to date.

Town Council has provided support in the past by way of a letter sent to the province and in person meetings with the local and provincial RCMP representatives.

ALTERNATIVES:

That Council for the Town of Pincher Creek direct administration to send a letter to the Premier, and to the Solicitor General indicating the Town's support for the RCMP to remain as Alberta's police force.

That Council for the Town of Pincher Creek receive the email from the Town Citizen regarding the KeepAlbertaRCMP survey as presented.

That Council for the Town of Pincher Creek contact the local citizen, Kelly Simpson and thank her for her email and support for the RCMP.

Following extensive consultation, conversation, and analysis, the Keep Alberta RCMP Engagement Tour report, <u>Your Police – Your Future: Listening to</u> <u>Albertans</u> is available now.

The NPF heard from more than 1,000 Albertans, First Nations Chiefs and Elders, elected officials (including Mayors, Reeves, Councillors, and provincial and federal representatives), and key stakeholders. The central themes and concerns were:

- A majority of Albertans told us they support the Alberta RCMP and do not want an expensive police transition
- The Government of Alberta should make priority investments to improve the justice system, increase police resources, and strengthen social services
- Participants were frustrated by the lack of consultation by Government and felt targeted investments would bring better and more immediate results to addressing crime in their communities

Town Council had recently considered and budgeted for an Animal Wildlife Management proposal with potential municipal partnerships in this southern region of Alberta. Senior wildlife biologist Maria Didkowsky is researching a potential program to help educate and manage wildlife issues

Total count: 96

Notes: All deer observed in and adjacent to town were mule deer. Agricultural fields east of Pincher or west of the west entrance off the 507 were not searched. Groups within Town owned lands around Walmart were observed for deer.

Several bucks have lost their antlers already, which indicates a reduced body condition early in the winter.

Caveats: no properties were searched on foot. Only observations from a vehicle were completed.

Deer Locations

- 3 deer between MD office and Graveyard
- 3 deer at turnoff to Veterans Park campground
- 4 at corner of Willow
- 7 bedded in Veterans memorial park
- 4 just NE of Walmart against fence
- 12 west of Walmart, west of highway 6
- 2 deer in front of Vertical Church
- 10: 5 crossing Bev McLaughlin, 5 on the east of Bev McLaughlin
- 1 fawn east of hospital by playground
- 11 on the hill south of Vertical Church (2 may be the previous observed in front of church)
- 7 between west Pincher entrance off #507 and Co-op mall.
- 5 bedded along alley north of subdivision west of co-op mall
- 20 deer in small subdivision area of West Avenue. Some by playground, some in back yards. One back yard had 11 deer- perhaps there is a food source here?
- 2 on Pine Ridge col-de-sac
- 2 east of St. Michael's school
- 3 west of Matthew Halton school (Davidson)




Figure 1 Location of mule deer in Pincher Creek. Larger red circles indicate larger groups (not to scale). Blue line indicates route covered by vehicle.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The Town of Pincher Creek in financial partnership with the MD of Pincher Creek hosted an annual reuse/recycle fair for many years. In the past, the event has been organized by the Town of Pincher Creek with financial contributions from both the Town, the MD of Pincher Creek and a grant from the Province of Alberta.

In 2020, due to Covid-19 and a suspension of the round-up grant the event in Pincher Creek was put on hold. The round-up grant through Alberta Recycling is currently accepting applications for 2023.

A request from the community has been brought forward to the Communities in Bloom committee to bring back the reuse fair for our community. Additionally, community members have been asking if the reuse fair will be returning.

ALTERNATIVES:

That Committee of the Whole for the Town of Pincher Creek accepts the information as presented.

That Committee of the Whole for the Town of Pincher Creek directs administration to bring the reuse fair back to 2024 budget discussions.

IMPLICATIONS/SUPPORT OF PAST STUDIES OR PLANS:

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

This event was not included in the 2023 operating budget. A grant for a portion of costs could be applied for and a request for partnership could be considered.

Residents have asked for the reuse fair to return. The Town of Pincher Creek will be judged this summer through the Communities In Bloom program and the reuse fair could be considered an asset to the judging panel. Reusing and recycling is part of the Communities in Bloom program.
